24 MILLION AMERICANS Poverty in the United States: 1969

This report presents statistics on poverty in the United States in 1969, based on the March 1970 Current Population Survey. The detailed tables present data for such characteristics of the poor as race, family status, size of family, employment status, work experience, occupation, education, earnings, income, and income deficit. Where available, data are presented for three racial classifications: (1) all races, (2) white, and (3) Negro. Although the primary focus of this report is on the United States as a whole, poverty data are also presented by region and type of residence. A description of the poor in 1969 and some analysis of the changes in the composition of the poor that have occurred between 1968 and 1969 and during the past decade are included.

This is the second Census Bureau report to present detailed poverty data based on the revised poverty definition adopted as the official standard in 1969 (see <u>Definitions and Explanations</u>, page 15, for a description of the revised definition). Since the detailed tables in this report cover one year only, they are more comprehensive than those found in the first report, "Poverty in the United States: 1959 to 1968," <u>Current Population Reports</u>, Series P-60, No. 68.

Some highlights of the data presented in this report are:

- In 1969, 24.3 million persons had incomes below the poverty level, a decrease of 1.1 million since 1968 and 15.2 million over the past decade. There was no significant change in the number of poor families between 1968 and 1969, but a 41 percent decline since 1959. Poor families headed by a man decreased by about one-half during this 10-year period, while there was no significant change in the number of poor families headed by a woman. Persons of Negro and other races constituted 31 percent of the poor in 1969, although they comprised only 12 percent of the total population.
- The proportion of persons below the poverty level decreased slightly between 1968 and 1969, from 12.8 percent to 12.2 percent. About 1 out of 10 families were poor in 1969, compared with about 1 out of 5 in 1959. Families headed by a person of Negro and other races were poor at a rate of about 27 percent in 1969, more than three times the poverty rate of about 8 percent for white families.

- In 1959, poor persons were about equally distributed between the South and the remainder of the country. By 1969, 54 percent of the poor lived outside the South. Over the past 10 years the proportion of the poverty population living in metropolitan areas has increased from about 44 percent to 51 percent. About 36 percent of the poor in the South lived in metropolitan areas in 1969 compared with 63 percent in the North and West.
- Sixty-one percent of poor male family heads and 43 percent of poor female family heads worked in 1969. About 90 percent of poor male heads who did not work were either ill or disabled, or can be presumed to be retired. About 72 percent of poor female heads who did not work gave family and home responsibilities as their main reason for not working in 1969.
- Poor Negro heads of families were more likely to have worked than their white counterparts. Seventy-one percent of the Negro male heads worked in 1969 compared with 59 percent for white male heads. For female heads of families the corresponding figures were 49 percent and 39 percent, respectively.
- While about two-thirds of all poor families had income from earnings in 1969, earnings accounted for only about one-half of their total aggregate income. In contrast, income from earnings accounted for about nine-tenths of the aggregate income for families above the poverty level. The largest categories of other income for poor families were social security payments and public assistance, from which 32 percent and 27 percent, respectively, of all poor families, received benefits.
- In 1969, it would have taken approximately \$10.1 billion to raise the aggregate incomes of all poor families to the poverty level. The average poverty gap for poor families in 1969 was \$1,280. Fourteen percent of all poor families had deficits within \$250 of their respective poverty thresholds.
- By decreasing the various poverty thresholds to 75 percent of the existing thresholds, the number of poor persons would drop by 40 percent in 1969, and the poverty rate for persons would drop from 12 percent to 7 percent. Conversely, increasing the poverty thresholds to 125 percent of the existing thresholds would increase the poverty population by 44 percent and raise the poverty rate to 17 percent. As the poverty level is increased, the proportion of the poor who are white increases slightly.

Persons Below the Poverty Level

Between 1968 and 1969, the number of poor persons declined by about 1.1 million, or 4.3 percent (table A). The proportion of persons below the poverty level decreased slightly, from 12.8 percent in 1968 to 12.2 percent in 1969. During the past 10 years, the number of poor persons in the United States declined from 39.5 million to 24.3 million. This represents a decline of about 38 percent in the poverty population since 1959. The percent of persons below the poverty level declined from about 22 percent in 1959 to 12 percent in 1969.

Between 1959 and 1969, the proportion of persons of Negro and other races who were poor dropped from 56 percent to 31 percent. For white persons, the percent who were poor decreased from 18 percent in 1959 to approximately 10 percent in 1969. The poverty rate for persons of Negro and other races remained about three times that for whites. Although white persons continued to make up over two-thirds of all poor persons, persons of Negro and other races remained disproportionately over-represented in the poverty ranks. In 1969, persons of Negro and other races constituted 31 percent of the poor, although they comprised only 12 percent of the total population.

Persons living in families accounted for about 88 percent of the poor in 1959 and 80 percent in 1969 (table B). This change was not as large for members of poor families of Negro and other races as it was for poor white family members. About 88 percent of poor persons of Negro and other races were in families in 1969 compared to 92 percent in 1959. In contrast, 76 percent of poor white persons were in families in 1969 compared to 86 percent in 1959. Members of families of Negro and other races have increased from 29 percent of all poor family members in 1959 to 35 percent in 1969. Among poor families with a male head in 1969, children under 18 years of age in families of Negro and other races accounted for about 32 percent of all such family members, while in poor families headed

by women, children of Negro and other races accounted for about 52 percent of all children in these families.

Conversely, unrelated individuals (i.e., persons not living with relatives) represented about 20 percent of the poor in 1969, up from about 12 percent in 1959. Since 1959, the number of poor unrelated individuals under 65 years old decreased by about 14 percent (table D). However, this decline was offset by an 11 percent increase in the number of aged unrelated individuals, resulting in no significant change in the total number of poor unrelated individuals between 1959 and 1969 (4.9 million). Aged unrelated individuals now account for about 55 percent of all poor unrelated individuals.

In 1959, poor persons were about equally distributed between the South and the remainder of the country (table C). By 1969, about 46 percent of all poor persons lived in the South and 54 percent lived outside the South.

Over the past 10 years, the proportion of the poverty population residing in metropolitan areas increased from 44 percent to 51 percent. However, there was a large degree of variation by region in

the proportion of the poor who lived in metropolitan areas. About 36 percent of the poor in the South lived in metropolitan areas in 1969 as compared with 63 percent in the North and West. While the same proportion of poor whites and Negroes lived in metropolitan areas in the South (about 36 percent), in the North and West 56 percent of poor white persons and 94 percent of Negro persons lived in metropolitan areas.

Characteristics of Families Below the Poverty Level

There was no significant change in the number of poor families between 1968 and 1969. There were about 5 million poor families in 1969, a decrease of about 41 percent since 1959 (table D). About one-tenth of all families in the United States were poor in 1969 as compared with 19 percent in 1959. The number of poor families headed by men has decreased by about one-half between 1959 and 1969 while the number of poor families headed by women has shown no significant change during the same period.

For both male and female headed families, the poverty rate for Negroes was considerably greater than that for whites in 1969 (table E). Negro families comprised about 19 percent of all poor families with a man as head, but 40 percent of poor families with a woman as head.

The rate of poverty for families with female heads was higher than that for families headed by men at every age interval. For example, approximately 60 percent of all families with female heads under 25 years old were poor in 1969, as contrasted with only 9 percent of families headed by men in that age group. About 16 percent of families

with an elderly male head and 24 percent of comparable families with a female head were poor. Families headed by a man 65 years and over accounted for about one-third of all poor families with a male head while families with an aged woman as head accounted for about one in seven of all families with a female head. The median age of male heads below the poverty level was about 53 years compared with about 39 years of poor female heads.

Families of any size having a male head were poor at rates far below those for female headed families. The poverty rate for all male headed families was 7 percent as compared with 32 percent for female headed families. About 18 percent of families with a male head who had seven or more persons in the family were poor as contrasted with 66 percent of comparable families with a female head.

The chances that a family with children would be poor tended to rise as the number of children in the family increased. Families with a male head who had one or two children under 18 years of age were poor at a rate of about 4 percent, while male headed families with five or more children were poor at a rate of 19 percent. About one-third of female headed families with one or two children were poor, as compared with three-fourths of the families with a female head with five or more children. About 46 percent of poor male headed families had no family members under 18 years, while only 17 percent of poor female headed families had no children living with them.

Approximately 22 percent of male heads and 43 percent of female heads with less than 8 years of school completed were poor in 1969 while only 3 percent of male heads and 18 percent of female heads with some college had incomes below the poverty level. About 60 percent of all poor male heads completed less than 9 years of school as compared with 42 percent of poor female heads.

Approximately 61 percent of poor male heads of families worked in 1969, as compared with 43 percent of the female family heads. This difference primarily reflects the inability of female heads to leave their family responsibilities to find work. About 72 percent of poor female heads who did not work gave family and home responsibilities as their main reason for not working.

Forty-seven percent of poor male heads who did not work gave illness or disability as the reason. Another 43 percent of poor male heads who did not work were over 65 years of age and gave "other" as their reason for not working, and can therefore be presumed to be retired. It might be noted that only about 2 percent of the poor family heads who did not work in 1969 gave inability to find work as their reason for not working. It does not appear then that greater employment opportunities alone would significantly help the large group of poor family heads who did not work.

About 34 percent of poor male heads of families and 13 percent of poor female family heads worked 50 to 52 weeks in 1969. In contrast, 74 percent of male family heads and 47 percent of the female heads of families above the poverty level worked year round. Families with male heads who worked all year had a poverty rate of about one-half that for all families with a male head. Families headed by women who worked year round were poor at a rate of about one-third that for all female headed families. The poverty rate of 11 percent for these female headed families was, however, about three times the poverty rate for comparable male headed families (3 percent).

Poor Negro heads of families, regardless of sex, were more likely to have worked than their white counterparts. Seventy-one percent of the Negro male heads worked in 1969 as compared to 59 percent for white male heads. For female heads of families the corresponding figures were 49 percent and 39 percent, respectively (table 14). Despite having worked at higher rates than their white counterparts, the proportion of Negro heads of families who were poor was still higher than that for whites.

The jobs of poor family heads who worked in 1969 were concentrated heavily in those occupational groups which are low-skilled and low paying. Twenty percent of the poor male heads who worked were service workers or nonfarm laborers and 27 percent worked as farmers or farm laborers. About 25 percent of all male heads who worked

as farmers or farm laborers were poor. This occupational group, along with nonfarm laborers, were the only groups which had a poverty rate above the average for all male heads who worked.

About one-half of all poor female family heads who worked were in service occupations. Operatives and clerical and sales workers made up the bulk of the remaining workers. Female family heads who worked in white collar occupations had below average poverty rates, while almost all other occupational groupings were well above the average for all poor female heads of families who worked.

Poor male headed families were about equally distributed between the South and the balance of the country in 1969, while about 44 percent of poor families with a female head resided in the South and 56 percent lived in the North and West (table F).

A majority of poor female headed families lived in metropolitan areas in both 1959 and 1969. About 55 percent of poor families headed by a woman resided in metropolitan areas in 1959 and about 62 percent in 1969. In contrast, over one-half of poor male headed families lived in nonmetropolitan areas in both years. Of all poor families, the proportion residing in central cities of metropolitan areas increased from 25 percent in 1959 to 30 percent in 1969.

With regard to unrelated individuals, two-thirds of all these persons lived in the North and West in 1969. Over one-half of the poor unrelated persons lived in metropolitan areas in both 1959 and 1969, and in 1969, 64 percent of those lived within the central cities of metropolitan areas.

Type and Source of Income

A large portion of the aggregate income of families below the poverty level came from sources other than earnings in 1969. While about two-thirds of all poor families had income from earnings in 1969, earnings accounted for only about one-half of their total aggregate income (table G). In contrast, income from earnings accounted for about nine-tenths of the aggregate income for families above the poverty level.

The proportion of poor and nonpoor families receiving income other than earnings did not differ greatly (68 percent and 61 percent, respectively). However, 48 percent of the aggregate income of poor families was attributable to income other than earnings compared with only 10 percent for families above the poverty level. There were significant differences in the type of other income received between families above and families below the poverty level. The largest categories of other income for poor families were Social Security payments and public assistance, from which 32 percent and 27 percent, respectively, of all poor families, received benefits. Public assistance and Social Security payments each made up about 19 percent of the total aggregate income of poor families, while for nonpoor families, the combined income from Social Security and public assistance comprised only about 3 percent of the total aggregate income. The largest category of income other than earnings for nonpoor families was dividends, interest, and rent. While about 45 percent of these families received income of this type, only about 15 percent of poor families received such income.

With regard to sex of head, poor families with a male head received about 61 percent of their total

income from earnings as compared to 33 percent for families with a female head. For families with a male head, Social Security accounted for the largest proportion of the income other than earnings, while for female headed families public assistance income made up not only the majority of their total unearned income, but two-fifths of their total aggregate income.

Poverty Gap and Aggregate Income Deficit

The poverty definition used in this report is based on total money income received during the preceding calendar year. The dollar gap between the poverty threshold and the amount of income received is thus a measure of the degree of impoverishment of a family or unrelated individual. However, caution must be exercised in comparing the average poverty deficit of families of different racial groups. Since the poverty thresholds used in this report are based on family size and composition, apparent differences in the average income deficits of racial groups may, to some extent, be a function of the differences in these characteristics. It must also be remembered that the poverty thresholds in this report vary according to the sex of the family head. Thus, differences in the average poverty deficit between families with a male or female head may be attributable to both differences in thresholds and to differences in family size and composition.

The average (mean) poverty gap for all poor families in 1969 was \$1,280 (table H). For poor families with a male head, the average poverty deficit was about \$1,170. The average deficit for families with a male head and one family member under 18 years was \$1,260 as contrasted with \$1,860 for comparable families with six or more family members under 18 years.

On the average, families with a female head had income deficits of about \$1,470, ranging from \$780 for families with no children to \$2,630 for families with six or more children. There was no clear differential relationship between the average income deficit for white and Negro families with a female head as the number of family members under 18 years increased.

The average deficit for male unrelated individuals was about \$840. The deficit for Negroes was about \$130 greater than that for whites (\$810). For female unrelated individuals the average poverty gap was about \$750. As was the case for males, the average deficit for Negro female unrelated individuals (\$810) was significantly larger than that for their white counterparts (\$740).

In 1969, 16 percent of poor male headed families had incomes within \$250 of their respective poverty thresholds. Twenty-two percent of these families with no children under 18 had deficits of less than \$250 compared with about 11 percent of families with children under 18.

About 11 percent of families with a female head had deficits within \$250 of their respective thresholds. Twenty-three percent of those with no family members under 18 were within this interval while only about 8 percent of those with children had deficits of this size.

In 1969, it would have taken approximately \$10.1 billion to raise the aggregate incomes of all poor persons to the poverty level (table I). The aggregate income deficit has decreased by about \$3.5 billion since 1959, reflecting the decrease in the number of poor persons. White persons accounted for about 72 percent of the total deficit in both 1959 and 1969. Persons in families accounted for about 72 percent of the total deficit in 1959 and 63 percent in 1969. This decrease reflects the increase of unrelated individuals as a percent of all poor persons. Poor families with a female head accounted for 20 per-

cent of the income deficit for white persons and 42 percent of the deficit for persons of Negro and other races.

Unrelated individuals made up about 20 percent of the poverty population in 1969, but accounted for about 37 percent of the income deficit in that year. Approximately 41 percent of the income deficit for whites and 27 percent of the income deficit for persons of Negro and other races was attributable to unrelated individuals in 1969. About two-thirds of the deficit for unrelated individuals was contributed by females.

Variations of the Poverty Level

In the past, interest has been shown in establishing alternate poverty levels. By tabulating data on persons with incomes 25 percent below and above the established poverty thresholds, a picture of those persons with incomes near the poverty line is shown. By decreasing the poverty level by 25 percent in 1969, the number of poor persons is decreased by 40 percent (table J). This would reduce the percent below the poverty level from 12 to 7 percent.

Raising the poverty level by 25 percent would increase the poverty population by 44 percent and the poverty rate to 17 percent.

Raising the poverty line to 125 percent of the existing poverty level in 1969 would increase the number of poor white persons by 47 percent and the number of poor Negroes by 34 percent. Similarly, with a decrease in the poverty level by 25 percent, there is a greater percentage decrease in the white poor (42 percent) than in the Negro

poor (35 percent). With regard to sex of head, increasing the poverty line to 125 percent would raise the number of persons in male headed families by about 61 percent in contrast to a 26 percent increase in the number of persons in families with a female head (table K).

As the poverty level increases, the proportion of the poor in 1969 living in families increases

from 77 percent at the 75 percent level to 83 percent at the 125 percent level. White persons account for 66 percent of the poverty population at the 75 percent level, increasing slightly to 70 percent at the 125 percent level. Also, the proportion of poor persons in families with a male head and male unrelated individuals increases as the poverty line is raised. At the 75 percent level, 52 percent of the poor were in such households, increasing to 63 percent at the 125 percent level.

Data based on the Current Population Survey showing the distribution of families, unrelated individuals, and persons, by income levels, have been published in the Series P-60 reports, numbers 1 to 53, 55 to 60, 62 to 66, 69,70, and 72. Data on poverty based on the original poverty definition appear in Current Population Reports, Series P-60, No. 54, "The Extent of Poverty in the United States: 1959 to 1966." Comprehensive data on poor persons and families based on the revised definition of poverty appear in Series P-60, No. 68, "Poverty in the United States, 1959 to 1968."

The characteristics of persons and families residing in metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas have been analyzed in Current Population Reports, Series P-23, No. 27, "Trends in Social and Economic Conditions in Metropolitan Areas," and P-23, No. 33, "Trends in Social and Economic Conditions in Metropolitan Areas."

Data on the characteristics of residents of metropolitan poverty areas have been published in Current Population Reports, Series P-23, No. 19, "Characteristics of Families Residing in Poverty Areas: March 1966," P-60, No. 61, "Characteristics of Families and Persons Living in Metropolitan Poverty Areas: 1967," and P-60, No. 67, "Socioeconomic Trends in Poverty Areas, 1960 to 1968." Statistics from the 1960 Census of Population for poverty and nonpoverty areas in each of the 100 standard metropolitan statistical areas with a population of 250,000 or more have been published in a 1960 Census of Population Supplementary Report, PC(S1)-54, entitled "Poverty Areas in the 100 Largest Metropolitan Areas."

Definitions and Explanations

Population coverage. This report excludes inmates of institutions. It includes only those members of the Armed Forces living off post or with their families on post.

Farm-nonfarm residence. The farm population refers to rural residents living on farms. The method of determining farm-nonfarm residence in the present survey is the same as that used in the 1960 census and in the Current Population Surveys since 1960, but differs from that used in earlier surveys and censuses. According to the current definitions, the farm population consists of all

persons living in rural territory on places of less than 10 acres yielding agricultural products which sold for \$250 or more in the previous year, or on places of 10 acres or more yielding agricultural products which sold for \$50 or more in the previous year. Rural persons in institutions, motels, and tourist camps, and those living on rented places where no land is used for farming are not classified as farm population. The nonfarm population, as the term is used here, comprises persons living in urban areas and rural persons not on farms.

Metropolitan-nonmetropolitan residence. The population residing in standard metropolitan statistical areas (SMSA's) constitutes the metropolitan population. Except in New England, an SMSA is a county or group of contiguous counties which contains at least one city of 50,000 inhabitants or more, or "twin cities" with a combined population of at least 50,000. In addition to the county, or counties, containing such a city or cities, contiguous counties are included in an SMSA if, according to certain criteria, they are essentially metropolitan in character and are socially and economically integrated with the central city. In New England, SMSA's consist of towns and cities, rather than counties. The metropolitan population in this report is based on SMSA's as defined in the 1960 census and does not include any subsequent additions or changes.

Central cities. The population inside SMSA's is further classified as "in central cities" and "in suburban rings." With a few exceptions, central cities are determined according to the following criteria:

- 1. The largest city in an SMSA is always a central city.
- 2. One or two additional cities may be secondary central cities on the basis and in the order of the following criteria:
 - a. The additional city or cities have at least 250,000 inhabitants.
 - b. The additional city or cities have a population of one-third or more of that of the largest city and a minimum population of 25,000.

Geographic regions. The four major regions of the United States, for which data are presented in this report, represent groups of States, as follows:

Northeast: Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont.

North Central: Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, Wisconsin.

South: Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware, District of Columbia, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Maryland, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia.

<u>West:</u> Arizona, Colorado, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming, Alaska, and Hawaii.

Income. For each person 14 years old and over in the sample, questions were asked on the amount of money income received in the preceding calendar year from each of the following sources: (1) Money wages or salary; (2) net income from nonfarm self-employment; (3) net income from farm self-employment; (4) Social Security; (5) dividends, interest (on savings or bonds), income from estates or trusts or net rental income; (6) public assistance or welfare payments; (7) unemployment compensation, government employee pensions, or veterans' payments; (8) private pensions, annuities, alimony, regular contributions from persons not living in this household, net royalties, and other periodic income.

The amounts received represent income before deductions for personal taxes, Social Security, bonds, etc. When an indefinite amount was reported by the respondent, a specific value was assigned during processing wherever possible. If the indefinite amount was reported in terms of a range, the midpoint of the range was assigned (i.e., \$10,000 to \$15,000 was coded as \$12,500). Open-ended amounts were converted to designated specific amounts; e.g., over \$10,000 was coded as \$16,000.

It should be noted that although the income statistics refer to receipts during the preceding year the characteristics of the person, such as age, labor force status, etc., and the composition of families refer to the time of the survey. The income of the family does not include amounts received by persons who were members of the family during all or part of the income year if these persons no longer resided with the family at the time of enumeration. On the other hand, family income includes amounts reported by related persons who did not reside with the family during the income year but who were members of the family at the time of enumeration.

Data on consumer income collected by the Bureau of the Census cover money income (exclusive of certain money receipts such as capital gains) prior to deductions for taxes. The fact that many farm families receive part of their income in the form of rent-free housing and goods produced and consumed on the farm, rather than in money, should

be taken into consideration in comparing the income of farm and nonfarm residents. It should be noted that nonmoney incomes are also received by some nonfarm residents. They often take the form of business expense accounts, use of business transportation and facilities, full or partial compensation by business for medical and educational expenses, etc. In analyzing size distributions of income, it should be recognized that capital gains tend to be concentrated more among higher income units than among lower ones.

Money wages or salary is total money earnings received for work performed as an employee during the income year. It includes wages, salary, Armed Forces pay, commissions, tips, piece-rate payments, and cash bonuses earned, before deductions were made for taxes, bonds, pensions, union dues, etc.

Net income from nonfarm self-employment is net money income (gross receipts minus expenses) from his own business, professional enterprise, or partnership. Gross receipts include the value of all goods sold and services rendered. Expenses include costs of goods purchased, rent, heat, light, power, depreciation charges, wages and salaries paid, business taxes (not personal income taxes), etc. The value of salable merchandise consumed by the proprietors of retail stores is not included as part of net income.

Net income from farm self-employment is net money income (gross receipts minus operating expenses) from the operation of a farm by a person on his own account, as an owner, renter, or sharecropper. Gross receipts include the value of all products sold, government crop loans, money received from the rental of farm equipment to others, and incidental receipts from the sale of wood, sand, gravel, etc. Operating expenses include cost of feed, fertilizer, seed, and other farming supplies, cash wages paid to farmhands, depreciation charges, cash rent, interest on farm mortgages, farm building repairs, farm taxes (not State and Federal income taxes), etc. The value of fuel, food, or other farm products used for family living is not included as part of net income. In general, inventory changes were not considered in determining net income; however, replies based on income tax returns of other official records do reflect inventory changes.

Social Security includes Social Security pensions and survivors' benefits, and permanent disability insurance payments made by the Social Security Administration prior to deductions for medical insurance and railroad retirement insurance checks from the U.S. Government.

Dividends, interest (on savings or bonds), income from estates or trusts, or net rental income includes dividends from stockholdings or membership in associations, interest on savings or bonds, periodic receipts from estates or trust funds, net income from rental of a house, store, or other property to others, and receipts from boarders or lodgers.

<u>Public</u> <u>assistance</u> <u>or</u> <u>welfare</u> <u>payments</u> include public assistance payments such as old-age assistance, aid to families with dependent children, and aid to the blind or totally disabled.

Unemployment compensation, government employee pensions, or veterans' payments include: (1) Unemployment compensation received from government unemployment insurance agencies or private companies during periods of unemployment and any strike benefits received from union funds; (2) government employee pensions received from retirement pensions paid by Federal, State, county, or other governmental agencies to former employees (including members of the Armed Forces) or their survivors; (3) money paid periodically by the Veterans' Administration to disabled members of the Armed Forces or to survivors of deceased veterans, subsistence allowances paid to veterans for education and on-the-job training, as well as so-called "refunds" paid to ex-servicemen as GI insurance premiums; also includes (4) workmen's compensation received periodically from public or private insurance companies for injuries incurred at work. The cost of this insurance must have been paid by the employer and not by the person.

Private pensions, annuities, alimony, regular contributions from persons not living in the household, royalties, and other periodic income include the following types of income: (1) Private pensions or retirement benefits paid to a retired person or his survivors by a former employer or by a union, either directly or through an insurance company; (2) periodic receipts from annuities or insurance; (3) alimony and child support; (4) contributions received periodically from persons not living in the household; (5) net royalities; and (6) other periodic income such as military family allotments, net gambling winnings, and other kinds of periodic income other than earnings.

Receipts not counted as income. Receipts from the following sources were not included as income: (1) Money received from the sale of property, such as stocks, bonds, a house, or a car (unless the person was engaged in the business of selling such property, in which case the net proceeds would be counted as income from self-employment);

(2) withdrawals of bank deposits; (3) money borrowed; (4) tax refunds; (5) gifts; and (6) lumpsum inheritances or insurance payments.

All sources of income may be combined into two major types:

Total money earnings -- the algebraic sum of money wages or salary and net income from farm and nonfarm self-employment; and

Income other than earnings -- the algebraic sum of all sources of money income except wages and salaries and income from self-employment.

Total money income. The algebraic sum of money wages and salaries, net income from self-employment, and income other than earnings represents total money income. The total income of a family is the algebraic sum of the amounts received by all income recipients in the family.

The income tables for families and unrelated individuals include in the lowest income group (under \$1,000) those that were classified as having no income in the income year and those reporting a loss in net income from farm and nonfarm self-employment or in rental income. Many of these were living on income "in kind," savings, or gifts; or were newly constituted families, unrelated individuals who had recently left families, or families in which the sole breadwinner had recently died or had left the household. However, many of the families and unrelated individuals who reported no income probably had some money income which was not recorded in the survey.

Median income. The median income is the amount which divides the distribution into two equal groups, one having incomes above the median, and the other having incomes below the median.

Mean income. The mean income is the amount obtained by dividing the total income of a group by the number of families or unrelated individuals (as appropriate) in that group.

Income per family member. The income per family member is the average amount of income available to every man, woman, and child in a family. Income per family member is derived by dividing the total family income of a group by the number of family members in the same group.

The Poverty Definition. Poverty statistics presented in Census Bureau reports prior to publication of Current Population Reports, Series P-60, No. 68, "Poverty in the United States, 1959 to 1968," were based on the poverty index developed by the

Social Security Administration (SSA) in 1964. This index provided a range of poverty income cutoffs adjusted by such factors as family size, sex of the family head, number of children under 18 years old, and farm-nonfarm residence. At the core of this definition of poverty was a nutritionally adequate food plan ("economy" plan) designed by the Department of Agriculture for "emergency or temporary use when funds are low." The SSA poverty cutoffs also took into account differences in the cost of living between farm and nonfarm families. Annual revisions of the poverty income cutoffs were based on price changes of the items in the economy food budget.

As a result of deliberations of a Federal Interagency Committee in 1969, the following two modifications to the original SSA definition of poverty were recommended: (1) that the SSA poverty thresholds for nonfarm families be retained for the base year 1963, but that annual adjustments in the levels be based on changes in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) rather than on changes in the cost of food included in the economy food plan; and (2) that the farm poverty thresholds be raised from 70 to 85 percent of the corresponding nonfarm levels. The combined impact of these two modifications resulted in an increase of 360,000 poor families and 1.6 million

poor persons in 1967. The reasons for making these changes are outlined below.

Change in cost of living adjustment. Annual revisions of the SSA poverty thresholds were based only on the average per capita cost of the foods in the economy food budget. This method of updating the poverty cutoffs did not fully reflect increases in the overall cost of living during the 1960's. The pace at which the general cost of living advanced in recent years was not uniformly matched by increases in the price of goods in the economy food plan. Thus, general price changes since 1959 were not paralleled by comparable changes in the poverty thresholds.

The differences between changes in the cost of the economy food budget and the overall cost of living led to the adoption of the CPI as the basis for annual revisions in the poverty cutoffs. Although the CPI is not designed to measure the changing market conditions faced solely by poor families, it does reflect the fact that prices of food and nonfood commoidities do not always advance at the same rate. Employing the CPI to adjust the poverty thresholds annually has another advantage over the earlier adjustment technique. Although the economy food plan is repriced annually, the data are not published regularly but are available only on request. The CPI, on the other hand, is regularly published and is a generally accepted measure of changes in the "cost of living." In 1969, the poverty thresholds ranged from \$1,757 for an unrelated individual 65 years old and over to \$6,101 for a family with seven or more persons (table L). average poverty threshold for a nonfarm family of four headed by a male was \$3,745.

Change in the farm-nonfarm relationship. Under the old definition, the poverty thresholds for farm families were adjusted for the average value of food consumed by these families which they had grown themselves. The poverty cutoffs for farm families were established at 70 percent of the nonfarm levels based on a 1961 study of household consumption which indicated that the value of food produced by farm families for home use amounted to about 30 percent of their total food budget.

Up to the present time, no entirely satisfactory means of determining the income required for equivalent levels of living for farm and nonfarm families has been provided by studies on this subject. Further research is needed to analyze the differences in the costs between farm and nonfarm families. Although it is not yet possible to quantify exactly all the factors contributing to cost of living differences between farm and nonfarm families, research already completed suggests that the differences are not as great as provided for by the 70 percent differential. After weighing the available evidence, the Review Committee agreed that narrowing the farm-nonfarm differential to 85 percent more nearly reflects the overall cost of living differences between farm and nonfarm families than the previously used differential.

Alternate poverty levels. Because the poverty levels currently in use by the Federal Government do not meet all the needs of the analysts of the data, two variations of the poverty definition were introduced at the same time that modifications were made to the SSA poverty index--one is set at 75 percent of the official government standard and the other at 125 percent of this standard. Some data, based on these two alternate poverty levels, are presented in tables J and K of this report. However, all the data presented in the detailed tables of Current Population Reports, Series P-60, No. 68, "Poverty in the United States, 1959 to 1968" have been tabulated for these additional levels. Requests for these unpublished data, giving a specific description of the figures desired, may be made in writing to the Chief, Population Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233.

Weighted average thresholds at the poverty level. The poverty cutoffs used by the Bureau of the Census to determine the poverty status of families and unrelated individuals consist of a set of 252 thresholds arranged in a four-dimensional matrix consisting of family size (from one person to seven or more persons) cross-classified by presence and number of family members under 18 years old (from no children present to six or

more children present), sex of head, and farmnonfarm residence. The one- and two-person families are further differentiated by age of head (under 65 years and 65 years and over). The total family income of each family in the sample is tested against the appropriate poverty threshold to determine the poverty status of that family. (If the family's total income is less than its corresponding poverty cutoff, the family is classified as poor. Otherwise, it is classified as nonpoor.) The average thresholds shown in table L, however, were weighted by the presence and number of children. For example, for a given size of family, sex of head, and residence category, the weighted average threshold for that group is obtained by multiplying the dollar amount for each presence and number of children category within the given family size by the number of families in that category. These products are then aggregated across the entire range of presence and number of children categories, and the total aggregate is divided by the total number of families in the group to yield the weighted average threshold at the poverty level for that size of family.

Because family composition varies by farm-non-farm residence, the weighted average thresholds at the poverty level for farm families, as shown in table L, will not be exactly 85 percent of the nonfarm levels. Moreover, since family composition does not remain constant from year to year, the weighted average thresholds for 1969 will not reflect, identically, the change in the CPI between 1969 and earlier years.

Since the basic thresholds used to determine the poverty status of families and unrelated individuals are applied to all families and unrelated individuals, the weighted poverty thresholds are derived using all families and unrelated individuals rather than just those families and unrelated individuals classified as poor. Consequently, to obtain the weighted poverty thresholds for families and unrelated individuals below 75 percent and below 125 percent of the poverty level, the weighted poverty thresholds shown in table L may be multiplied directly by 0.75 and 1.25, respectively.

Poverty gap. The poverty gap is the difference between the total income of families and unrelated individuals below the poverty level, and their respective poverty thresholds. In computing the income deficit, families reporting a net income loss are assigned zero dollars and for such cases the poverty gap is equal to the poverty threshold. This measure provides an estimate of the amount which would be required to raise the incomes of all poor families and unrelated individuals to their respective poverty thresholds.

Median income deficit of the poor. The median income deficit is the amount which divides the distribution into two equal groups, one having an income deficit above the median, and the other having an income deficit below the median.

Mean income deficit of the poor. The mean income deficit is the amount obtained by dividing the total income deficit of a group below the poverty level by the number of families or unrelated individuals, (as appropriate) in that group.

Deficit per family member. The deficit per family member is the average amount of money necessary to raise every man, woman, and child in a family out of poverty. The deficit per family member is derived by dividing the total family income deficit of a group by the number of family members in the same group.

Family. The term "family," as used in this report, refers to a group of two or more persons related by blood, marriage, or adoption and residing together; all such persons are considered as members of the same family. Thus, if the son of the head of the household and the son's wife are in the household, they are treated as part of the head's family. On the other hand, a lodger and his wife not related to the head of the household or an unrelated servant and his wife are considered as additional families, and not a part of the household head's family.

Head of family. One person in each family was designated as the head. The head of a family is usually the person regarded as the head by members of the family. Women are not classified as heads if their husbands are resident members of the family at the time of the survey. Married couples related to the head of a family are included in the head's family and are not classified as separate families.

<u>Size of family.</u> The term "size of family" refers to the number of persons who are living together and are related to each other by blood, marriage, or adoption.

Unrelated individual. The term "unrelated individuals," as used in this report, refers to persons 14 years old and over (other than inmates of institutions) who are not living with any relatives. An unrelated individual may constitute a one-person household by himself, or he may be part of a household including one or more other families or unrelated individuals, or he may reside in group quarters such as a rooming house. Thus, a widow living by herself or with one or more other persons not related to her, a lodger not related to the head of the household or to anyone else in the household,

and a servant living in an employer's household with no relatives are examples of unrelated individuals.

Own children. "Own" children in a family are sons and daughters, including step children and adopted children, of the family head.

Family members under 18 years old. Persons in families, other than the head or wife, who were under 18 years old and who were related to the head of the family by blood, marriage, or adoption, were classified as family members under 18 years old. This concept differs from the previously used concept of related children under 18 years of age, which was defined as all single (never married) persons under 18 years old in families who were related to the head of the family by blood, marriage, or adoption, in that the family members under 18 concept is not restricted by marital status.

Number of earners. This number includes all persons in the family with \$1 or more in wages and salaries, or \$1 or more or a loss in net income from farm or nonfarm self-employment.

Age. The age classification is based on the age of the person at his last birthday.

Race. The population is divided into three groups on the basis of race: white, Negro, and "other races." The last category includes Indians, Japanese, Chinese, and any other race except white and Negro. "Other races" are usually shown in combination with the Negro population.

Years of school completed. Data on years of school completed in this report were derived from the combination of answers to questions concerning the highest grade of school attended by the person and whether or not that grade was finished. The questions on educational attainment apply only to progress in "regular" schools. Such schools include graded public, private, and parochial elementary and high schools (both junior and senior high), colleges, universities, and professional schools. whether day schools or night schools. Thus, regular schooling is that which may advance a person toward an elementary school certificate or a high school diploma, or a college, university, or professional school degree. Schooling in other than regular schools was counted only if the credits obtained were regarded as transferable to a school in the regular school system.

The median years of school completed is defined as the value which divides the distribution into two equal groups, one having completed more schooling and one having completed less schooling than the median. These medians are expressed in terms of a continuous series of numbers representing years of school completed. For example, a median of 9.0 represents the completion of the first year of high school and a median of 13.0 means completion of the first year of college.

Labor force and employment status. The definitions of labor force and employment status in this report relate to family heads and unrelated individuals 14 years old and over.

Employed. Employed persons comprise (1) all civilians who, during the specified week, did any work at all as paid employees or in their own business or profession, or on their own farm, or who worked 15 hours or more as unpaid workers on a farm or in a business operated by a member of the family, and (2) all those who were not working but who had jobs or businesses from which they were temporarily absent because of illness, bad weather, vacation, or labor-management dispute, or because they were taking time off for personal reasons, whether or not they were paid by their employers for time off, and whether or not they were seeking other jobs. Excluded from the employed group are persons whose only activity consisted of work around the house (such as own home housework, painting or repairing own home, etc.) or volunteer work for religious, charitable, and similar organizations.

Unemployed. Unemployed persons are those civilians who, during the survey week, had no employment but were available for work and (1) had engaged in any specific jobseeking activity within the past 4 weeks, such as registering at a public or private employment office, meeting with prospective employers, checking with friends or relatives, placing or answering advertisements, writing letters of application, or being on a union or professional register; (2) were waiting to be called back to a job from which they had been laid off; or (3) were waiting to report to a new wage or salary job within 30 days.

Labor force. Persons are classified as in the labor force if they were employed as civilians, unemployed, or in the Armed Forces during the survey week. The "civilian labor force" is comprised of all civilians classified as employed or unemployed.

Not in the labor force. All civilians 14 years old and over who are not classified as employed or unemployed are defined as "not in the labor force." This group who are neither employed nor seeking work includes persons engaged only in own home housework, attending school, or unable to work because of long-term physical or mental

illness; persons who are retired or too old to work; seasonal workers for whom the survey week fell in an off season; and the voluntarily idle. Persons doing only unpaid family work (less than 15 hours) are also classified as not in the labor force.

Occupation of longest job. Persons are classified according to the civilian job held longest during the year. Persons who held two jobs or more were reported in the job at which they worked the greatest number of weeks.

Work experience. A person with work experience is one who, during the preceding calendar year, did any civilian work for pay or profit or worked without pay on a family-operated farm or business at any time during the year, on a part-time or full-time basis.

Weeks worked in the income year. Persons are classified according to the number of different weeks during the preceding calendar year in which they did any civilian work for pay or profit (including paid vacations and sick leave) or worked without pay on a family-operated farm or business.

Part-time or full-time jobs. A person is classified as having worked at part-time jobs during the preceding calendar year if he worked at civilian jobs which provided less than 35 hours of work per week in a majority of the weeks in which he worked during the year. He is classified as having worked at full-time jobs if he worked 35 hours or more per week during a majority of the weeks in which he worked.

<u>Year-round full-time worker.</u> A year-round full-time worker is one who worked primarily at full-time civilian jobs (35 hours or more per week) for 50 weeks or more during the preceding calendar year.

Nonworker. A nonworker is one who did not do any civilian work in the calendar year preceding the survey.

Main reason for working part year. For persons who worked 1 to 49 weeks during the year, the main reason for working part year is based on the response to the question "What were you doing most of the remaining weeks?"

Main reason for not working. For persons who reported that they did not work at a civilian job for pay or profit or on a family-operated farm or business during the year, the main reason for not working is derived from the response to the question "What were you doing most of last year?"

Rounding. Percentages are rounded to the nearest tenth of a percent; therefore, the percentages in a distribution do not always add to exactly 100.0 percent. The totals, however, are always shown as 100.0.

Base figures. An estimate of the size of the base (number of persons, number of families, etc.) of each percent is shown in most of the tables in this report. The base figures shown in this report were prepared by inflating weighted sample results to agree with independent estimates of the population based on statistics updated from the 1960 census.

Nonresponses and Allocations

In the March 1970 CPS, no information was recorded for approximately 5 percent of the 50,000 households because no interview could be obtained during the week in which the enumeration was conducted. In order to account for these households, the weights assigned to other sample households of similar characteristics residing in the same sample areas were increased accordingly. In addition, complete income information was not reported for about 14 percent of all families and 11 percent of unrelated individuals 14 years old or over. Overall, about 10 percent of all persons 14 years old and over in households that were interviewed did not report complete income information.

In order that the maximum amount of information can be utilized, missing income items are imputed or allocated by values which are obtained from active respondents with similar economic and demographic characteristics. Beginning with the March 1962 survey, when a respondent did not answer one or more of the income items, all of his income data were imputed.

Beginning with the March 1966 survey, however, in the event a respondent did not answer one or more of the income questions, the missing income data for this person were imputed for only those income items which were not answered. Each of earnings items was handled individually. whereas income items other than earnings were handled as a group. Characteristics used in this imputation are age, family status, race, residence, weeks worked, and major occupation group. The income amount assigned to a nonrespondent is that observed for another person with similar demographic and economic characteristics who did respond and who has been selected systematically in the order in which individual records are processed.

In the tabulation of income from surveys prior to 1962, the distributions by income levels had

been based only on those cases which reported complete income information. The assumption implicit in this method was that persons who do not provide income information have the same income distribution as those who do provide such information. Using income data for 1958, a comparison was made of the income distributions obtained before and after the assignment of income to nonrespondents on the basis of known demographic and economic characteristics. This comparison indicated that the procedure for making individual assignments of income to nonrespondents resulted in slightly higher estimates of the proportion of families and individuals in the upper income classes than those obtained from the distributions based solely on those reporting on income. (See Current Population Reports, Series P-60, No. 33, tables F and G.)

Beginning with the 1967 CPS, the Bureau of the Census introduced improved income edit and allocation procedures. The main feature of the new procedures is a more refined method for imputing missing income data which expands the use of information already known about that person. Among the major improvements made affecting the income data are the following: (1) an expanded set of social and economic characteristics within which the imputations are made; in addition to age. race, occupation, and weeks worked, the new procedures include sex and type of family member as major variables within which the missing income items are imputed; (2) the elimination of inconsistent reporting which resulted in having workers with no earnings and earners with no weeks worked; and (3) the new imputation procedure assigns missing earnings entries first and then utilizes the earnings information to assign missing sources of income other than earnings.

However, because of coding errors in the processing of the 1968 CPS data, in that year alone it was not possible to apply all the aforementioned improvements to the editing and allocation procedures. Since these errors produced an underestimate of income, they had the effect of overstating the number of poor families by about 175,000 and the number of poor persons by approximately 450,000. In addition, it was discovered that the computer procedures for editing certain incorrect income codes caused an upward bias in the income data for some respondents and therefore would tend to produce an underestimate of the number of poor. The impact of this faulty editing procedure has not yet been fully documented. Due to errors affecting the income data for 1967, poverty data for that year are not strictly comparable with those shown for 1966, 1968, and 1969.

Comparison of 1966 poverty data according to original and revised editing and allocation procedures. In order to evaluate the impact of the new procedures, the poverty data from the March 1967 CPS were rerun, thus providing a bridge for the 1966 income year showing the results of both the earlier and the new procedures. Both series of data are shown in table 1. The general impact of the new allocation procedure was to shift the income distribution slightly upward, thus decreasing by 416,000 the number of families below the poverty level. A more detailed description of the new computer editing and allocation procedures may be found in Current Population Reports, Series P-60, No. 59, "Income in 1967 of Families in the United States," pages 17 to 19.

Modifications in collecting income data in the March-April 1969 CPS. Several modifications were introduced in the collection of income data in the March and April CPS supplements. These include (1) extension of the interview period of the six rotation groups for which income questions were asked in March and the use of followup forms in these six groups to accommodate household respondents who needed more time to obtain the required income information (it is estimated that some members of approximately 4,400 households, or 9 percent of the total relevant households, made use of these followup forms); (2) modification of the design and content of the questionnaire to allow for more detailed questioning of certain income items; thus, boxes for gross receipts, business expense, and net income have been added to the self-employment income questions to help the interviewer and respondent determine net income, and "yes-no" circles were added to the questions on income other than earnings in order to ascertain whether the respondent received or did not receive income; (3) field office editing procedures were extended to a 100-percent income edit of the CPS schedules; (4) training instructions were strengthened by including more detailed explanations and more examples; and (5) the interview group training session was shifted from February to March.

Modifications in collecting income data in the March 1970 Current Population Survey. The Bureau introduced modifications in the collection of income data for the March 1970 CPS supplement. These were: (1) An advance letter informing households about the collection of income data was mailed to all households except those in the first and fifth months. The latter households received special letters which explained the need for collecting both CPS and census data; (2) information on work experience and income was collected simultaneously for the full sample (in previous years, work experience information was collected separately from income data); (3) the interview period was extended one week for three-fourths

of the sample (using followup calls and separate questionnaires). In addition, modified procedures which were incorporated in the March 1969 CPS supplement were also implemented in the March 1970 CPS. Overall, data indicate that the use of these procedures has resulted in some improvement in the collection of income data. The family income nonresponse rate has not only dropped by 5 percentage points (from 19 to 14 percent) but also it appears that the proportion of aggregate income amounts collected in the March 1970 CPS relative to benchmark totals have increased slightly in the March 1970 CPS supplement as compared with the proportion collected in the March 1969 CPS supplement. Although nonresponse rates for families by poverty status are not available, it is known that families in the lower income intervals tend to have lower nonresponse rates than those in the middle and upper income intervals.2 This is due in part to the fact that lower income families have less complicated financial arrangements than those in other income groups. There is also some evidence that the information on income and work experience is more consistent than previous information. Detailed results will be published at a later date.

Source and Reliability of the Estimates

Source of data. The estimates for the United States are based on data obtained in the Current Population Survey of the Bureau of the Census. For 1969 and 1970 the sample is spread over 449 areas comprising 863 counties and independent cities, with coverage in each of the 50 States and the District of Columbia. Approximately 50,000 households are eligible in the Current Population Survey for interview each month. Of this number, 2,250 occupied units, on the average, are visited but interviews are not obtained because the occupants are not found at home after repeated calls or are unavailable for some other reason. In addition to the 50,000, there are also about 8,500 sample units in an average month which are visited but are found to be vacant or otherwise not to be enumerated. For the years prior to 1967, the sample was spread over fewer areas with fewer interviewed households. Prior to the March 1966 survey, income data were collected from only 75 percent of the households included in the CPS. See Current Population Reports, Series P-23, No. 22, "Concepts and Methods Used in Manpower Statistics from the Current Population Survey," June 1967, pp. 7-10, for more information about the sample design.

²For a more detailed discussion of this topic see paper by Mitsuo Ono and Herman P. Miller, "Income Nonresponses in the Current Population Survey," Published in <u>Proceedings of the Social Statistics Section</u>, American Statistical Association, 1969.

The estimation procedure used in this survey involved the inflation of the weighted sample results to independent estimates of the civilian non-institutional population of the United States by age, race, and sex. These independent estimates were based on statistics from the 1960 Census of Population; statistics of births, deaths, immigration, and emigration; and statistics on the strength of the Armed Forces. To these totals were added the population in the Armed Forces living off post or with their families on post. A further adjustment was made so that all members of a household got the same weight while at the same time leaving unchanged the estimates for certain basic labor force categories.

Reliability of the estimates. Since the estimates in this report are based on a sample, they differ somewhat from the figures that would have been obtained from a complete census, using the same schedules, instructions, and enumerators. Particular care should be exercised in the interpretation of figures based on relatively small numbers of cases as well as small differences between figures. As in any survey work, the results are subject to errors of response and nonreporting and to sampling variability.

In most cases the schedule entries for income are based on memory rather than on records, and in the majority of cases on the memory or knowledge of one person, usually the wife of the family head. The memory factor in data derived from field surveys of income probably produces under-estimates because the tendency is to forget minor or irregular sources of income. Other errors of reporting are due to misrepresentation or to misunderstanding as to the scope of the income concept.

The standard error is primarily a measure of sampling variability, that is, of the variations that occur by chance because a sample rather than the entire population is surveyed. As calculated for this report, the standard error also partially measures the effect of response and enumeration errors, but it does not measure, as such, any systematic biases in the data. The chances are about 68 out of 100 that an estimate from the sample would differ from a complete census figure by less than the standard error. The chances are about 95 out of 100 that the difference would be less than twice the standard error.

To show comparable poverty data for 1969 and 1959 by detailed type of residence, it was necessary to use data from the 1960 census rather than from the 1960 Current Population Survey (CPS). In the text, tables based on 1960 census data are identified as such; other tables for 1959 are based on 1960

CPS data. The type of residence classification used in the 1960 CPS was based on data from the 1950 census. Therefore, to achieve comparability with March 1970 CPS data, special tabulations of poverty data from the 53,000 households in a 1-in-1,000 sample of 1950 census data were prepared. These tabulations were designed to eliminate conceptual differences between 1960 census data and the 1970 CPS data. However, it should be noted that the data obtained from CPS and from the decennial censuses are still not totally comparable, due in large part to differences in interviewer experience and in the training of interviewers, and accounts for an additional component of error which is not reflected in the standard error tables.

The figures presented in tables M, N, O, P,Q, and R are approximations to the standard errors of various estimates shown in this report. In order to derive standard errors that would be applicable to a wide variety of items and could be prepared at a moderate cost, a number of approximations were required. As a result, the tables of standard errors provide an indication of the order of magnitude of the standard errors rather than the precise standard error for any specific item.

Table M contains the standard errors of estimates of the number of persons in a given class, for the years 1968 and 1969. Table N contains the standard errors of estimates of the number of families in a given class, for the years 1968 and 1969. Table N should also be used for items which can typically appear only once in a given family, as for example, "Number of female heads of family." Table O contains the standard errors of estimates of the number in a given class, for data obtained from the 1-in-1,000 sample of the 1960 census.

The reliability of an estimated percentage, computed by using sample data for both numerator and denominator, depends upon both the size of the percentage and the size of the total upon which the percentage is based. Estimated percentages are relatively more reliable than the corresponding absolute estimates of the numerator of the percentage, particularly if the percent is large (50 percent or greater).

Illustration of the use of table of standard errors. Table A of this report shows that in 1969, there were 7,618,000 persons of Negro and other races below the poverty level. Table M shows the standard error on an estimate of this size to be approximately 126,000. The chances are 68 out of 100 that the estimate would have been a figure differing from a complete census by less than 126,000. The chances are 95 out of 100 that the estimate would have been a figure differing from

a complete census by less than 252,000 (twice the standard error).

Of these 7,618,000, 889,000, or 11.7 percent, are unrelated individuals 14 years and over. Table P shows the standard error of 11.7 percent on a base of 7,618,000 to be approximately 0.6 percent. Consequently, chances are 68 out of 100 that the estimated 11.7 percent would be within 0.6 percentage points of a complete census figure, and chances are 95 out of 100 that the estimate would be within 1.2 percentage points of a census figure, i.e., this 95 percent confidence interval would be between 10.5 and 12.9 percent.
